- Targeting health and research inequality in the North relative to the rest of the UK.



DELIVERING FOR OUR MEMBERS

At last year's AGM, we set goals for the NHSA's forthcoming year. We committed to delivering value to our members, and on our successful Research England funding, through **cluster development**, improving national and **international** visibility of the assets and capabilities within the health and life science sector, delivering against the Life Sciences **Industrial Strategy**, and **advocating** for our members and the North of England. We identified five interlinked thematic areas of acknowledged excellence to align our activity around: **diagnostics and therapeutics; healthy ageing; health inequalities; data and digital;** and **mental health**.

Over the last year we have been delivering against these promises. We are building networks and partnerships, we are strengthening international links and awareness of the North, and our collective voice is being heard in the corridors of power. We said we would deliver and we are, as you can see below in our year in highlights.

CLUSTER DEVELOPMENT

We are bringing together leading northern experts in the development, evaluation and delivery of advanced therapy medicinal products to advocate for the sector within the region, and to work together to explore pan-northern opportunities.

The NHSA's health inequalities group brought together the NIHR ARC Health Inequalities leads for a successful bid which will be led out of Newcastle and Durham universities. It has collaborated with the ARCs on a series of reports into COVID and a forthcoming Health for Wealth COVID update report. We are developing a diagnostics and MedTech network across the North to collaborate on any opportunities for investment and international business development.

We regularly bring together the four northern Biomedical Research Centre (BRC) directors and managers and are working closely with the centres to connect them into the wider NHSA network.

We recently held our first health data network meeting which brought together senior digital leads from across the North, and we plan to grow this network over the coming year.

We have brought organisations from the NHS and academia together to explore northern collaboration around the evaluation of mental health innovation and working with industry.

We convened a group of data experts across a broad coalition of northern partners to develop the Better Care North Partnership bid for HDR UK funding, which was successful and has led to the creation of HDR North.

ADVOCACY

Earlier this year we delivered a letter signed by NHSA council members to Downing Street which called on the Prime Minister to draw on the North's world-leading expertise in health to level up the inequality in North-South health research funding.

We met with No 10 Advisor Will Warr to discuss the way in which investment in the North's expertise in health innovation can help to level up the region for the benefit of the whole of the UK.

We published a report highlighting the impact of the ground-breaking data-driven Connected Health Cities (CHC) programme in the North of England.

We held an online CHC roundtable with leaders in the NHS, public health, academics, and policymakers to discuss how the CHC health data sharing project across the North of England could help inform the national response to COVID-19.

We facilitated contributions from NHSA members to the Health Devolution

Commission report 'Building Back Health and Prosperity' which recommends comprehensive health devolution across England.

We hosted fringe events at the Conservative and Labour party conferences which featured Health Secretary Matt Hancock as a speaker at the Conservative event, and Anneliese Dodds, now Shadow Chancellor, at our Labour event.

We have raised the profile of the NHSA and our members at events throughout the year including The New Statesman Northern Powerhouse Conference, Big Tent Digital, IPPR State of the North launch, and the Great North Convention.

We have been asked to help shape the programme for the upcoming IGNITE medical innovation summit to ensure northern contributions are represented.

We continue to engage key health and innovation leaders in online conversations including our annual #NorthInnovationWomen social media campaign.

Our visibility in national, regional and trade media continues to be boosted with more than 200 pieces of coverage secured over the last 12 months. This includes multiple Yorkshire Post front pages and coverage on MSN, Liverpool Echo, Manchester Evening News, The Chronicle, The Journal, Lancashire Post, Sheffield Star, regional BBC radio, Digital Health News and many more.

There were 93,140,481 potential opportunities to see, hear or read about the NHSA in the media this year (based on average readership figures of print, broadcast and online coverage).

Our social media reach and engagement also continues to grow. Over the last year, our tweets have been seen more than one million times and we've gained more than 600 new followers. On LinkedIn, we had more 40k post views and we increased our followers by around 260.

INTERNATIONAL



We led a delegation of UK ageing experts to Toronto for a major international ageing and brain health event and collaboration activity with colleagues from across our Canadian network of healthy ageing expertise.

We continue to strengthen our links in Israel, with two main initiatives in place – working to develop commercial engagement opportunities by running our own digital partnering session, and by developing our relationship with the Israeli Innovation Authority. We have further strengthened innovation and research collaboration links between Asia and the North following our visit to Japan and South Korea in October last year.

We are working with the British High Commission in Singapore to develop collaborations, particularly around clinical testing of COVID-19 diagnostic tests with the Leeds NIHR Medtech and In Vitro Diagnostic Co-operative (MIC).

• We supported the delivery of a joint seminar with Taiwan's Ministry of Economic

Affairs (Biotechnology & Pharmaceutical Industries Promotion Office) to showcase northern life sciences and identify areas of collaboration.

We represented the NHSA and its members at the online BioUS conference as part of the Department for International Trade's (DIT) virtual UK delegation.


We took part in the International HealthTech Working Party, hosted by ABHI and DIT and joined their 'signposting' working group to ensure that the North is visible and accurately represented in future programmes.

INDUSTRIAL STRATEGY

Our multimillion-pound Research England-funded collaboration with MedCity began in March and has signalled an exciting new era for the NHSA as we work in partnership to improve the visibility of UK life sciences expertise on the international stage and support the implementation of the Industrial Strategy.

We have supported and coordinated bid writing and consortia building within the ISCF Healthy Ageing and also EPSRC NetworksPlus frameworks. These propositions have involved collaboration and engagement between academia, industry and NHS. We have established connections with the ISCF Directorates for the ISCF Challenges directly relevant to our work, including: Healthy Ageing, From Data to Early Diagnosis and Precision Medicine, Accelerating Detection of Disease and Leading-edge Healthcare.

We continue to work closely with other leading northern organisations, including the Northern Powerhouse Partnership, N8 and NP11.



WHAT'S ON THE HORIZON

Final word from Dr Séamus O'Neill



The health and life sciences landscape has changed significantly since I took up the position of Chief Executive at the Northern Health Science Alliance a year ago. But whilst new unprecedented challenges have arisen, such as the COVID-19 pandemic, many of the long-standing health challenges we face in the North remain the same.

We're committed to tackling these challenges on behalf of our member institutions and, as you can see from what we've achieved together over the last 12 months, we have made progress and have much to be proud of. However, we know there is a long road ahead and more still to be done.

As you will be aware, we've worked closely with our members over the year on the Office for Life Sciences bid which sets out opportunities for investment in the health and life sciences sector in the North of England, to ensure our region is front and centre in the Government's plans to help rebalance the economy post-COVID and post-Brexit.

This is a vital piece of work which encompasses the core areas of activity for us; advocating for the system; joining up the North; supporting members to deliver against the Life Sciences Industrial Strategy; and promoting international visibility of the excellence in the North.

In the lead up to the Comprehensive Spending Review, our focus will be on further strengthening the positioning of NHSA member organisations as key components of the health and life sciences innovation landscape with a view to securing greater investment in the North.
